


#### FAREWELL TO MRS ZOBEL

### SOVEREIGN HILL CAMP RECOUNTS

She was one of the angry looking ladies. She seemed even angrier now. "Follow me children", she blabbed on alot. I will be the first (of many) to admit I zoned out when she was talking. We eventually got to a changing room where we got changed into our outfits, they were really cool! When we left the room we all looked like 1850 students! As did almost everyone else, almost. Nash looked like a hippy. He wasn't in my group though. We headed toward school which was also a church. We were part of a living museum, our teacher told us. On the first school day we learnt our 12 times tables, some of us were given a job. After we did all our school we headed back to our cabins and had a quick Dinner. We could all tell some of us were getting homesick. I think most of us thought everything would be alright after the pantomime. Everyone was getting involved! Laughing, doing actions. It was so fun I can't even remember what it was about.* 

On the morning of the third day I woke up, all of us were looking forward to going home. I brushed my teeth and enjoyed my minty toast. We headed to the changing room, the teacher yelling the whole way. When we got to school we nailed our times tables and we were told that a very special

a figure was coming, the Vicor. We were told if we sang well and got all our and got all our times tables right he might make a donation. So when he came we were all on our best behaviour. He made a big donation of 30 shillings or two pounds. So Archie, our bell monitor, could get a real bell! Our teacher gave us a tour of the town. She showed us an average dwelling on the gold fields, the butcher and the river with gold in it. We had a tour of a new mine then returned to school. Omar was given the Wesleyan medallion and we were dismissed for the last time. We changed into our normal clothes, loaded our bags onto the bus and got on.

Bye Sovereign Hill. It was quite sad leaving, but I couldn't wait to see my parents again. I really enjoyed Sovereign Hill, I couldn't have asked for anything better for my last camp. I am grateful to all the teachers and parents for making camp so much fun. I will remember Sovereign Hill fondly for a long time to come. By Huw

Sovereign Hill Ballarat, 2023 Wednesday 8th Feb, By lacey.

At nine fifteen, the bus left. We arrived at Sovereign Hill at eleven thirty and collected our bags from the bus. We got sorted into our groups for the schools shortly after. All of our things were sorted into the downstairs cabins.

After the talent show we all got biscuits on our way back up to the cabins. Once we were set up we got into bed and some people had showers.

In the morning, we had the costume schools, so we went into the changing rooms to put on our clothes. I got a grey dress and a blue hat that was way too small but I wore it anyway. In the classroom, we were assigned desks with shelves underneath, and we wrote s's on a blackboard with chalk. At morning tea we sat in the shade and ate because it was hot that day.

After school we had dinner. It was pasta and for dessert we had a slice. Once we finished eating we went to a pantomime. We sat on the side of the room and I sat next to Lilly. It was called Blackbeard the pirate.

#### Day 3 the last day.

I had to quickly plait Aspen's hair again because we had school. Once everyone in our group had got changed, we walked over to the classroom and started the day. We had a doctor come, it was really funny. At morning tea, we had bread rolls again. After lunch we used ink to write in cursive. We had to write 12 pennies make one shilling. But after that we could write whatever we wanted. After school we had lunch in the cafeteria again. We had salad rolls. Just after the school day, we got on the bus and headed back to school. On the bus trip back, we drew on sticky notes and stuck them on our face. Once we were back at school we took a lot of photos and videos before we went home.

Overall, Sovereign Hill camp was really fun and I would go again. My favourite part was writing with ink and fountain pens and the mine tour!


